The European Air Transport Command (EATC) was established on 1st September 2010 and is located at Eindhoven air base in the Netherlands.

EATC nations:

The EATC nations are the Netherlands, Belgium, France, Germany, Luxembourg, Spain and recently Italy.

The command of the EATC rotates every two years between France and Germany. The current commander is German Major General (OF-7) Christian Badia. The deputy commander and chief of staff is French Brigadier General (OF-6) Pascal Chiffoleau.




% Strat AE on Military A/C versus Civilian A/C

Exchanged ATARES hours






Air-to-Air refuelling missions




More passengers and cargo transported with less aircraft and fewer flying hours



Vision 2025

What is the optimal fleet mix for the EATC in the future ? A question closely related to the future Air Transport demands of the EATC Participating Nations (PNs) and set forth in the paper "Vision 2025" through a visionary outlook on the future.

Multinational Aircraft Recovery Training (MART)

Co-organized by the EATC, this multinational training for mechanics gathers about 60 people from different nations.



Dangerous Goods Working Group

Established, in December 2014, to harmonise procedures and keep all parties involved up to date on current changes of civilian and military rules and regulations.





EATC Study Conference

Since 2011, the EATC has held its annual study conference for technical, logistical and operational subject matter experts to discuss ways to harmonise and standardise European Air Transport to enhance effectiveness and efficiency.



EATC Fleet Review

In 2014, PNs received the first Fleet Review report (on the year 2013) with valuable information on the composition of fleets, use of assets, technical developments and future trends.

EATC Flight Duty Regulation

In 2012, the EATC published a commonly adopted Flight Duty Regulation on flights and duty time limitations (FDR).



EATC Ground Operation Manual (EGOM)

The EGOM describes a set of multinational rules for ground handling crews and is in its final stages of approval before implementation with PNs.
